With Chiaverini's trademark blend of warmth, wit, and insight, the story explores how creativity and community sustain us through life's shifting seasons. Stitched together with humor, poignancy, and the enduring metaphor of quilting, *The Patchwork Players* invites readers to reflect on what it means to measure success, redefine legacy, and find joy in the unexpected patterns of our lives.



TOPICS & QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION

1. Julia Merchaud first appeared in *The Cross-Country Quilters* as a celebrated actress who reluctantly attended Elm Creek Quilt Camp to prepare for a movie role. If you've followed Julia's journey across the Elm Creek Quilts novels, how did it feel to reconnect with her in *The Patchwork Players*? How has she changed since readers first met her? If this is your first encounter with Julia, what were your initial impressions of her?
2. When Julia learns that key members of the cast intend to leave *A Patchwork Life*, she initially reacts with disbelief and denial. Did you find her response selfish, understandable, or both? If you could step into Julia's shoes, would you fight to extend the series, or gracefully let it end? Why?
3. Julia believes that recreating the bonding experience of Elm Creek Quilt Camp will solve her professional crisis. What does this reveal about her understanding of community and collaboration? Do you think her plan was rooted more in hope, fear, or optimism?
4. Much of the novel explores the tension between professional success and personal fulfillment. Julia has achieved extraordinary acclaim, yet finds herself questioning what truly matters. How do you define success in your own life? Did Julia's journey prompt you to reconsider your own priorities?
5. Quilting serves as both a literal skill Julia learned and a metaphor throughout the story. What does quilting symbolize for Julia at this stage of her life? How does the idea of piecing together disparate fragments and creating something new that is greater than the sum of its parts, resonate with your own experiences?
6. Several characters in the novel face pivotal moments that require courage—whether personal, creative, or professional. Which character's choices stood out most to you, and why?

7. The tension between endings and beginnings is a recurring motif in the novel—the end of a beloved series, the possibility of new projects, the parting of friends, the promise of new love. How does the novel balance nostalgia with hope for the future? How does Julia grapple with these realities? Did any of her reflections feel particularly relatable or poignant to you?

8. The Cross-Country Quilters offer Julia a model of generosity, inclusivity, and mutual support that contrasts sharply with Hollywood’s competitive culture. How do these two worlds differ in their values? How does Julia balance between them so she can thrive in both?

9. At its heart, the novel suggests that stories—whether stitched in quilts or told on screen—preserve memory and connect generations. How does this idea resonate with your own experience of storytelling, art, or craft?

10. Discuss any passages or moments that especially resonated with you. What themes lingered after you finished the book? What did you take away from Julia’s story?

ENHANCE YOUR BOOK CLUB

1. If *The Patchwork Players* is your first Elm Creek Quilts novel, try one of the other books in the series. Jennifer Chiaverini’s website, jenniferchiaverini.com, includes an FAQ page that lists the novels in order of publication and chronology. The beautifully designed site is also full of information on all of Chiaverini’s books, quilts, patterns, and upcoming events.

2. At your meeting, enjoy sparkling cider or champagne and canapés like Julia’s launch party, or savor Kansas-inspired comfort food as a nod to Sadie Henderson’s prairie homestead. For dessert, consider the autumn beverages and sweets the Patchwork Players enjoy at Elm Creek Quilt Camp—mini apple tarts, pumpkin cookies, and sweet potato petit fours served with coffee, tea, and mulled apple cider.

3. Julia believes that shared creative experience fosters connection. At your meeting, try a small collaborative activity. Have each member bring a fabric swatch, photo, or magazine clipping that symbolizes what your book club means to them; together, assemble the pieces into a metaphorical “club quilt” of stories. Did creating together change the dynamic of your group?

4. Create a “Patchwork Playlist.” Music often underscores emotional turning points in film and television. Ask each member to suggest one song that represents reinvention, friendship, or second chances. Compile them into a shared playlist and discuss how each selection connects to the novel’s themes.

A CONVERSATION WITH JENNIFER CHIAVERINI

***The Patchwork Players* is the twenty-fourth novel in the beloved Elm Creek Quilts series, and your thirty-sixth novel overall. What inspired you to welcome readers back to Elm Creek Manor in this new book, and with someone other than an Elm Creek Quilter in the starring role?**

Julia Merchaud debuted in 2001 in my third Elm Creek Quilts novel, *The Cross-Country Quilters*, as a Hollywood actress who reluctantly attends quilt camp to prepare for a movie role. In *The Patchwork Players*, I revisit Julia when she is thriving artistically but is facing the end of the long-running series that rejuvenated her career. It’s a story about creativity, community, resilience, and the courage to embrace change.

How does this novel connect to the Elm Creek Quilts series?

Even though much of *The Patchwork Players* takes place in Hollywood, Elm Creek Quilt Camp and the Cross-Country Quilters remain central to Julia's journey. She still draws strength from what she learned at quilt camp—that fulfillment comes not from fame or accolades, but through generosity and collaboration. Readers who've loved the Elm Creek Quilts novels will recognize the heart of those stories here too, expressed in both new and familiar settings, with favorite characters as well as several new faces.

Quilting once again appears as an important motif. Why is quilting such a powerful theme for you as a writer?

As a longtime quilter myself, I've learned that quilts tell stories of their own. They preserve memory, connect generations, and express the creativity of their makers. In Julia's case, quilting is a metaphor for reinvention—piecing together the fragments of her life after loss and disappointment to create something whole and meaningful. I return to quilting often in my novels because it reflects how women throughout history have stitched beauty and resilience into their daily lives.

What role do the Cross-Country Quilters play in Julia's personal growth and self-discovery?

They are her dearest friends, her quilting tutors, and her anchor. When the pressures of Hollywood or her own fears threaten to overwhelm her, she remembers their example—supportive, generous, and inclusive. Their presence in her life reminds her that she doesn't have to face unwelcome endings or uncertain new beginnings alone.

Many of your novels celebrate women's creative communities. How does *The Patchwork Players* continue that tradition?

I'm fascinated and inspired by women's creativity, resilience, and community. In my own career, I've been privileged to see how stories about quilters resonate with readers from all walks of life. In *The Patchwork Players*, Hollywood may seem worlds away from Elm Creek Quilt Camp—and in many ways it definitely is—but in both places, collaboration, creativity, and trust are essential. Julia realizes that the lessons she learned with the Cross-Country Quilters apply just as strongly in her professional life, even in a glamorous industry that often values competition over connection.

What was the most rewarding part of writing this story?

I loved giving Julia the opportunity to reflect on how far she has come. When readers first met her in *The Cross-Country Quilters*, it's fair to say that she was somewhat self-centered and defensive, but over the course of the series, she has become wiser, more generous, and more at peace with herself. Writing that transformation, and showing how quilting and friendship helped guide it, was very satisfying.

What do you hope readers will take away from Julia's story?

I hope readers will be reminded that it's never too late to reinvent yourself, to open your heart to change, and to recognize the true sources of meaning in your life. Julia's story is stitched together from joy and sorrow, ambition and humility, endings and new beginnings. I hope readers see reflections of their own journeys in hers.

Can you give us a preview of what you're working on now?

I'm currently writing *The Rational Dress Society*, a historical novel coming from Morrow in 2027. Set in Great Britain in 1881-1882, the story follows nineteen-year-old Josephine "Jo" Mayberry, the ambitious daughter of a Windsor solicitor, whose growing friendship with Florence, Viscountess Harberton, draws her into the spirited and controversial movement for rational dress reform. What begins as a question of clothing—whether a woman may dress sensibly for her health and comfort and still expect to be treated with civility—soon unfolds into a much larger examination of women's legal rights, public reputation,

family loyalty, and the courage to claim one's place in the world without apology. Jo experiences political activism, social intrigue, courtroom drama, romance, and female friendship as she comes of age in Victorian England. I can't wait to share her journey with readers.
